


Factsheet – What is the Global Partnership?



In 2015, world leaders made a commitment to end all forms of violence against children by 2030, as part of the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs). This moment presents an historic opportunity to unite the world behind a global, national and local movement to protect the world's most precious asset – its children. In July 2016, the Global Partnership to End Violence Against Children was created to help achieve this ambitious undertaking – in every country, every community and every family. The Partnership offers the opportunity for organizations dedicated to ending violence against children to come together, combine their efforts and maximize their impact.

STRATEGY

PARTNERSHIP

The persistence, scale and gravity of the problem of violence against children require **a global commitment to action**. And solutions can be delivered globally only if energies, skills and resources of all part of societies all around the world are mobilised. The Global Partnership aims to reach all those who work for children, strengthening connections. It offers the opportunity for key stakeholders - governments, UN agencies, international organizations, civil society, academics, private sector and children themselves- to come together, combine their efforts and maximise their impact.

Stakeholders can choose to engage at three levels: as 'Friends', 'Members' and/or 'Partners':

- **Friends** of End Violence are individuals that will receive regular updates on the achievements of the Partnership.
- Members work to end violence against children in accordance with the End Violence principles.
- **Partners** agree to execute part/s of the End Violence business plan.
