History

Terre des hommes (Tdh) Palestine was established in 1973 in response to child malnutrition in the West Bank. Tdh has been providing multi-sectoral protection services to vulnerable children and their families, targeting especially **child labour**, **injured children**, **and gender-based violence (GBV)**, mostly in Gaza. With an ultimate goal of prompting, enhancing and advocating children's rights who are in contact / conflict with the law, Tdh has launched its Access to Justice (A2J) program in Gaza and West Bank in 2012.

Access to Justice Challenges



Rights of children are not fully respected while in contact with the law



Limited homogeneous applicability of the related laws between West Bank and Gaza



Limited specific gender responsive approaches for girls in conflict and in contact with the law



Need of legal support to enhance children's access to alternatives to detention



Need to strengthen interaction and cooperation between formal and informal justice actors to promote restorative justice

Gaza: A Humanitarian Protracted Crisis



53% of Gaza population live in poverty (Palestinian Central Bureau of Statistics, PCBS, 2017)



Children up to 14 years constitute 42% of the Gaza Strip population (PCBS,2019)



Unemployment among youth in Gaza exceeded 70%, and it is even higher for females at 78% (PCBS, 2018)



Overall 73% of key informants across Gaza Strip mentioned domestic violence as the main risk for children (CPRA, 2018)



An estimated number of 15,850 children between 10 and 17 are engaged in child labour

Tdh's programmatic objectives



Child protection

Provide vulnerable children, especially children exposed to child labour, GBV and injured children with comprehensive package of child protection services.



Access to Justice

Promote a restorative approach based on child-friendly justice, encouraging non-custodial measures for children in contact/conflict with the law.



Humanitarian Action

To prevent further collapse of critical child protection, mental health, and psychosocial services and gender-based violence support in the Gaza Strip.




Tailored CP services for injured children (see Tdh infographic)

11,592 parents attended awareness raising sessions on CP concerns

4,752 children received specialized access to justice services

71 judicial stakeholders trained on restorative justice

Play with Nazeef-a Care and Natheef-a App

As part of Tdh's emergency project supporting the children of Gaza, Nazeef-a Care is an online game that engages 6 to 12 year-old children in a new way of "learning by playing", following two main purposes: 1) engaging children in good hygiene practices including handwashing with soap and use of water, and 2) monitoring and evaluating changes in their knowledge, attitude and practices. Nazeef-a care was used as an awareness raising tool during the lockdown observed by households in Palestine and beyond (Jordan, Egypt, Lebanon). Based on the same approach, Natheef-a App that targets teenagers adresses adolescence and puberty changes, such as menstrual hygiene and other topics that are not always openly discussed within the society.
